Admiral Stuart B. Munsch - Keynote Speaker



Admiral Stuart B. Munsch, a native of North Dakota, epitomized the finest qualities of a naval leader throughout his illustrious career. Graduating from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1985 with a degree in Electrical Engineering, he quickly distinguished himself as an exceptional student, excelling not only academically but also as a skilled marksman, earning All-American honors and a national championship in pistol shooting.

Following his time at Annapolis, Munsch embarked on a series of sea duty assignments, demonstrating his dedication and expertise aboard various vessels, including the USS Will Rogers,

USS Jefferson City, USS Kitty Hawk, and USS Tucson.

Munsch's commitment to service extended beyond the sea, as evidenced by his roles in U.S. Pacific Command, the White House Fellowship, and his command of the USS Albuquerque. His leadership prowess was further showcased during his tenure in the Pentagon and overseas, commanding Submarine Group 7 and Task Forces 74 and 54.

Promoted to flag rank, Munsch continued to make significant contributions, serving in key positions within OPNAV, the Joint Staff, and assuming command of Allied Joint Force Command in Naples, Italy.

He concurrently, serves as commander of U.S. Naval Forces Europe and U.S. Naval Forces Africa, demonstrating his ability to manage complex operations across diverse geographic regions.

Throughout his distinguished career, Munsch garnered numerous accolades, including multiple Defense Distinguished Service Medals, Navy Distinguished Service Medals, and Legion of Merit awards. His operational excellence and strategic acumen earned him the admiration of his peers and the respect of the international community.

The Nuclear Medical Science Officer for the 81st Civil Support Team (CST). He has served in this capacity for the last 7 years, and helped to bring national attention to the CST through his contributions to both the COVID19 pandemic response and the Williston explosives response.

He holds a master's degree in Radiation Health Physics, a bachelor's degree in Chemical Engineering, and is pursuing a doctoral degree in Systems Engineering. He is an active member in both the Health Physics Society (HPS) and the Clandestine Laboratory Investigating Chemists (CLIC) Association.

Prior to the CST, Hansen was a Platoon Leader at the 957th Multi-role Bridge Company, a Section Sergeant for the 816th Engineer Company, and a Squad Leader at the 815th Engineer Company.

Hansen's awards include the 2021 Theodore Roosevelt Leadership Award for Company Grade Officers from the National Guard Association, 2017 Honor Graduate from Engineering Basic Officer Leadership Course at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri, 2016 Distinguished Honor Graduate, Leadership Excellence Award, and Academic Excellence Award for the North Dakota Officer Candidate School graduating class, 2016 Honor Graduate from the Alabama Fast Track Officer Candidate School graduating class, and the 2012 Non-comissioned Officer of the year for the N.D. Army National Guard.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The cemetery office is open from 8:00am to 4:00pm CST Monday through Friday, except on State Holidays.

The cemetery gates are open to visitors 24/7.

All committal prayers at the North Dakota Veterans Cemetery are conducted in our Interment Building unless the cemetery director approves other arrangements. Arrangements for pallbearers, military honors and religious services are to be made by the funeral home.

DETERMINATION OF ELIGIBILITY

All interments require verification of eligibility of the Veteran, National Guardsman, Reservist, and spouse or dependent prior to the burial date. Verification of eligibility is based off of the Veterans discharge (DD 214 or its equivalent). This document must verify that the service member received an "Honorable", "Under Honorable Conditions" or "General" discharge.

We do allow pre-registration. To pre-register, you may complete our preregistration application and attach a copy of your discharge. This is a great way to provide us your documentation so when the time of need arises, your family does not need to worry about locating your proper paperwork. This is not a requirement to be interred here, but recommended.

SCHEDULING OF INTERMENTS

Requests for interments should be made at the earliest possible date. In the events of a full-body burial, we do require a funeral director to make all arrangements and be present for the burial. In the event of a cremation burial, if any committal services or Military Funeral Honor Services are being held, you must work with a funeral home and the funeral home representative must be present. In cases of a direct cremation burial (no services, drop off of urn for burial only) no funeral home is required and you may schedule directly with the cemetery.

We schedule interments on the hour, every hour, Monday - Friday, 9:00am - 3:00pm CST. Please contact our office for available times.

Please be certain to be on time as we will begin the service promptly on the

Please remember the committal service is not to exceed 5-10 minutes so our staff has adequate time to complete the burial and get ready for the next one.

Floral Regulations

FRESH CUT FLOWERS: Fresh cut flowers may be placed on graves at any time. Only temporary flower containers are permitted. Floral items will be removed from graves when they become faded or unsightly.

ARTIFICIAL FLOWERS: Artificial flowers may be placed on graves during the period of October 1st to the 10th day following Memorial Day.

<u>CHRISTMAS FLOWERS:</u> Christmas wreaths or blankets are permitted on graves during the Christmas season commencing 1 December and will be removed by caretakers on 1 February each year.

PERMANENT PLANTINGS: Permanent plantings will not be permitted on graves at any time. Potted plants will be permitted on graves during the period 10 days before and 10 days after Easter Sunday and Memorial Day.

COMMEMORATIVE ITEMS: Statues, vigil lights, glass objects of any nature or any other commemorative items are not permitted on the graves at any time.

<u>U.S. FLAG AND CEMETERY FLAGPOLE:</u> The flag of the United States will be displayed each day of the year. The flag of the United States will be brought to half-staff one-half hour before the first committal service of the day and returned to full staff one-half hour after the last service is completed for the day. On Memorial Day, the flag of the United States will be flown at half-staff until conclusion of the Memorial Day service and returned to full staff thereafter, or as directed by the Cemetery Director. All graves will be decorated on Memorial Day by the cemetery staff with 8"x12" United States Flags. U.S. Flags are not permitted on graves at any other time.

REMOVAL OF DECORATIVE ITEMS: During lawn mowing and ground maintenance season all floral items will be removed from graves when that section of the cemetery requires mowing or other maintenance.

<u>ADDITIONAL NOTE:</u> At no time may anything be affixed to the headstones. You may not affix stickers, flowers, pictures, balloons, memorabilia etc. to the upright granite headstone at any time.
